## OUTSTANDING FORESTRY ALUMNUS AWARD

Edward H. Givhan, Jr. '62 was recently presented the 1996 Outstanding Alumnus Award by the Auburn University School of Forestry and the Auburn Forestry Alumni Association. Givhan, a native of Scotsboro and a former Dallas County resident, spent his professional career with the Alabama-based Resource Management Service, Inc., the South's largest consulting manager of investment-grade forestland. He served as the company's president from 1991 until his retirement in 1995. The Birmingham resident was also a founding member of the Hancock Timber Resource Group, the world's leading manager of forest land investments for institutional investors.

Since 1984 the Auburn Forestry Alumni Association (AFAA) has presented its annual Alumnus Award at the Auburn Forestry Advisory Council Banquet. The Outstanding Forestry Alumnus Award, as it is so named, recognizes an exceptional

alumnus for outstanding contributions to forestry and society at large. Candidates must be graduates of Auburn University's School of Forestry (formerly the Department of Forestry) and are considered for the award based on their outstanding contributions to forestry in Alabama, nationally, or internationally. Character, integrity, and community contributions are also considered.

## THE W. KELLY MOSLEY ENVIRONMENTAL AWARD

Alan Bruce '78 recently received the W. Kelly Mosley Environmental Award at the annual meeting of the Alabama Forestry Association (AFA) in Perdido Beach. Bruce, who is currently the Woodlands Manager for Fort James Corporation in Pennington, received the award for his efforts in envisioning and constructing the Evan B. Allison Conservation Forest near Bellamy. Today, the Allison Forest is used as an outdoor classroom by students, landowners, garden clubs, and other interested individuals and groups.

Martha and Thelma Dixon were each presented the W. Kelly Mosley Environmental Award during a ceremony held earlier this year at the Solon Dixon Forestry Education Center near Andalusia. The awards were given in recognition of the contributions of the Dixon family to Auburn University, its forestry education program and to the State of Alabama. Both women were honored for their dedication in carrying on the commitment to preservation and education started by their husbands.

The Mosley Award was created in 1979 by W. Kelly Mosley '24 and the Franklin Foundation. The Environmental Awards program, formally known as the W. Kelly Mosley Environmental Awards for Achievements in Forestry, Wildlife and Related Resources, publicly recognizes and supports achievements or proposed endeavors which will result in the wiser use and renewal of natural resources. Award recipients receive a numbered print of a painting commissioned by the Mosley Awards Committee, a commemorative plaque, and a check in the amount of \$500.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN

Greetings to all our friends and alumni. I hope you like this Newsletter format. We made a commitment some time ago, in conjunction with our Alumni Association officers, to have a more attractive publication that would also serve as an annual report to our alumni. Two other steps were necessary to make the Newsletter a reality. Firstly, we had to have someone with the time and talent to devote



to the task. We had already employed Elizabeth Lanier on a part-time basis to help teach communication skills, and she has also taken on responsibility for the Newsletter. Secondly, the Auburn Forestry Foundation Board of Directors agreed that earnings on this endowment could be used to print the Newsletter. Please let us have your reaction to these changes, as well as suggestions for topics to be included in future issues.

The past year has been active as usual, but there have been a couple of new twists. One is the University's decision to move from quarters to a semester system effective fall term 2000. Even though that is three years away, all of the planning has to be finished by 1998 so that everything can be printed in the University Bulletin before the actual change-over takes place. Consequently, our faculty have been quite busy and will be busy for the next several months taking an in-depth look at our curricula and converting our quarter hour courses to semester courses. Our goal is to maintain Auburn's traditional high quality forestry program, but to take advantage of this transition to implement improvements where possible. One thing is for sure. We will maintain a strong summer camp program at the Dixon Center as the entry point for the professional curricula. The current goal is to maintain the junior core of professional courses with flexibility for concentrations in the senior year. The semester system may not accommodate this model as well as the quarter system, but, whatever the end product, I know it will be a quality academic experience for our students and continue our recent success in undergraduate education.

For the past four years, we have limited enrollment and admitted students to the professional curricula beginning with summer camp, or, as we now refer to it, summer practicum. We continue to have more students apply than we can accommodate. And, on the other end, the employment opportunities for graduates have been quite good.

The other new twist during the past year has been the emphasis on doing more with less. While most other univer-

sities, as well as firms and public agencies, have had much the same experience, it is influencing many of our traditional ways of doing business. One reason for this emphasis is the reduction in resources available from the state, but another, and probably the overriding reason, is the President's commitment to strategic planning and the need to define and justify our role and to increase our efficiency. One of the outcomes of strategic planning has been identification of programs with low enrollment and the requirement that such programs need to be justified or they will be closed. Unfortunately, our undergraduate degree in forest engineering falls in this category. We have never had many students in forest engineering, but this was anticipated when the program started. As a joint program between Forestry and Agricultural Engineering, it is the only B.S. degree in Forest Engineering in the South and one of the two in the country accredited by both the Society of American Foresters and the Accrediting Board for Engineering and Technology. One of the criteria for not closing a low enrollment program is uniqueness. Auburn's forest engineering program is unique in both the state and region, and we really expect it will be continued. But, this decision will not be made until sometime after the first of the year. If you have particular interest in this program or comments regarding its graduates, we would like to hear from you.

Elsewhere in this Newsletter, we have listed the individuals and organizations that have made a financial contribution to the School of Forestry over the past several months. I want to personally thank each of these for their interest and support. To my knowledge, increased emphasis on development/private giving is a fact of life with all universities. I am firmly convinced that the programs that are going to be able to move toward true excellence in the 21st Century are those that can blend significant private support with public resources. This combined support will be necessary to move to the forefront in terms of attracting and retaining faculty and in providing up-to-date teaching and research equipment and facilities. Angie Stephens, the School's Development Officer, is doing an outstanding job working with alumni and friends to identify private giving opportunities. If you would like to visit with Angie about these opportunities and our needs, please contact her through the School.

As also indicated elsewhere in the Newsletter, I will be retiring next spring. I want to thank all of the Auburn forestry family for your support and encouragement over the past 21 years. Vivian and I plan to remain in the Auburn area, and I look forward to a continuing personal and professional association with many of you.

Dr. Mark DuBols received an Award of Excellence at the annual meeting of Southern Extension Forest Resource Specialists for his mass media video entitled "Alabama's Forest Resources Today." He was also commended by the Chair of the forest industry Sustainable Forestry Initiative (SFI) Public Outreach and Education program for his leadership in the development of the landowner education packet distributed to 6,000 landowners in support of SFI.

Dr. Kathryn Flynn was recognized by Southern Extension Forest Resources Specialists in 1995 for her paper on "Ecosystem Management." She was also co-recipient with John Bliss of a National Woodland Owners Association award in 1996 for their publication on "Managed Forests for Healthy Ecosystems."

Dr. Glenn Glover '73 received the Carl Alwin Schenck Award at the annual meeting of the Society of American Foresters for his contributions to and excellence in forestry education.

Dr. Michael Golden '68 was presented the Harold E. Christen Award by the Auburn School of Forestry Faculty in recognition of his significant and meritorious service to teaching.

## DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

I am grateful to my fellow Development Committee members for the excellent job they have done to increase annual funds for the School of Forestry. The group of eleven members includes John Gerber, Steve Guy '72, Don Heath '73, Rick Jones '77, Dwain Luce '38, Greg Luce, Jim Martin '64, Jim Spears '58, Claude Swift '51, Frank Walburn '79, and me. In addition, Bob Lunford and Kathryn Flynn are our faculty representatives, and Cory Martin and Rick Schober are our student representatives.

We started with a goal of raising the annual giving level to \$100,000 per year. Through the hard work of the committee, with the phone-a-thon and annual mailings, the School of Forestry has raised \$114,350 as of August 12 for fiscal year 1997. We also raised \$102,819 during the 1995/1996 fiscal year ending September 30, 1996. These figures nearly double the 1994/1995 numbers.

During the past year and a half, the Development Committee has received commitments of \$226,710 to be paid out over the next five years. More than \$105,000 (nearly half) of these commitments are by businesses and individuals that have never given to the School before. This increases our base of opportunity for the future. These commitments would not have occurred without the solicitation by the Development Committee and the generosity of our donors.

Private gifts are extremely helpful since the 1996 and 1997 budgets were reduced from the 1993 budget by \$239,000, which is almost 11% of the total state appropriation for the School of Forestry. The School currently receives approximately 2.6 million from the state and faculty generate grants and contracts valued at \$1.3 million, while annual endowment earnings are approximately \$146,000. Ideally, the School needs the endowment earnings to be equal to at least half the state appropriation, or \$1.3 million. This was the message that the Development Committee shared, and Forestry friends responded. We appreciate it.

The overwhelming response of Forestry friends to ensure the future of Forestry at Auburn University has confirmed my belief in the mission of the Development Committee.
